

DOCTRINE OF SALVATION

1. Depravity- God's estimation of man.

A) Man's acts

Romans 3:23

"All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God."

B) Man's nature

Ephesians 2:1

"And you were dead in the trespasses and sins."

2. Imputation- "Glorious Exchange" (Martin Luther)

- A) Adam's sin is imputed to all humanity
- B) The Christian's sin is imputed to Christ
- C) Christ's righteousness imputed to Christians.
 - 2 Corinthians 5:21

"For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God."

3. Substitution- Christ died in our place.

Isaiah 53:6

"All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned—every one-to his own way; and the LORD has laid on him the iniquity of us all."

Notes:

4. Atonement- Making right right with God what was wrong with man through the work of Jesus Christ. Through Jesus Christ God's mercy replaces God's wrath.

A) Sacrifice- Jesus is the perfect sacrifice.

Hebrews 9:22

"Indeed, under the law almost everything is purified with blood, and without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness of sins."

B) Ransom- Jesus paid our ransom to free us from sin.

"For even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."

C) Propitiation- Jesus satisfies the holy demands of God. 1 John 4:10

"In this is love, not that we love God but that He loved us and sent His to be the propitiation for our sins."

D) Reconciliation- Relationship is restored and no longer broken.

2 Cor. 5:18

"All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation."
